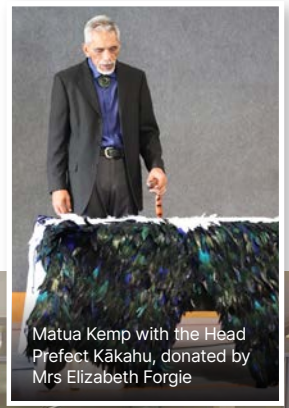

Dux and Proxime Accessit

Dux and Proxime Accessit are the most prestigious prizes we award at Kerikeri High School. The Dux is the top student in the school, and the Proxime Accessit is the runner up to the Dux. To be in consideration for these two top awards, students must firstly be a Year 13 Top Scholar. Every Top Scholar's achievement and participation across the Four Cornerstones is then reviewed and taken into consideration. We also consider how these students have exemplified our WAKA values.

Our 2023 Proxime Accessit is Grace Calnan.

Grace has been a Top Scholar every year and has participated in a wide range of academic extension opportunities during her seven years at Kerikeri High School.

In the Cultural Cornerstone Grace is a successful Debater and Public Speaker. She has participated in Debating every year, in winning Northland teams and participating in national competitions. Grace has regularly been a Kerikeri High School Speech finalist, as well as a member of the Concert Band and has been successful in Auctioneering.

In the Sporting Cornerstone, Grace has also participated in a wide range of sports, with elite sporting achievements in Sailing, representing our school with distinction over the last six years.

In Leadership with Service, Grace has been a Prefect, Peer Support Leader, Class Representative, Debating Coach and Adjudicator, on the Ball Committee, a Librarian, Kiwi Buddy, and has achieved a Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award.

In previous years Grace was the recipient of WAKA awards in Years 7-10, won the Wetton Cup for Year 9 Speeches, and the Dee Cup for Year 10 Speeches, won Junior and Intermediate Debating Awards, and was awarded the Bilkey Trophy for Sailor of the Year in 2021.

Grace was awarded Kerikeri High School Academic Honours Awards for both NCEA Level One and Level Two. She was also awarded Cultural Honours for her achievements in Debating. Grace has been awarded three Sporting Honours Awards for her achievements in Sailing and has a total of seven Honours awards.

Grace is now looking towards studying a double degree at Otago University in Law and Science, planning to major in genetics with a minor in bioethics. Grace intends to go into medical law and bioethics when she graduates.

Student Council

Our Student Council is chaired by our Head Students, Joe Howells and Ella Parker, and each Year Level has a representative on it. Student Council provides another way for the student body to have input into school decision making. Funds raised by the annual PTA Workday are spent at the discretion of the Student Council, always going towards something students benefit directly from but for which the school receives no funding.

This year, the Student Council has been very active and impactful in enhancing our school community. One of the notable achievements was our successful Daffodil Day campaign, where we raised \$1,870 for cancer research, showcasing our commitment to important causes. Additionally, we allocated resources to purchase a new school van. Inclusivity has been a focus for us, as we took the initiative to amend the constitution, now including members from diverse groups such as S.A.V.E, Student WAKA Team, Rainbow Group, Rangatahi Māori, and the Sports Council. We also extended our support to teams within our school by funding their participation in various regional and national events.

The Kerikeri High School Dux for 2023 is Joe Howells.

Joe was a Top Scholar every year and participated in an extensive range of academic extension opportunities. Joe also enjoyed a variety of sports in the Sporting Cornerstone while at Kerikeri High School.

In the Leadership with Service Cornerstone, Joe was our Head Boy, Class Representative, Peer Support Leader, Debating Coach and Adjudicator, served on the Student Council, in the Ball Committee, a Librarian, involved with Daffodil Day and Pink Shirt Day, S.A.V.E., participated in the Model United Nations, a Kiwi Buddy, on the Student WAKA Team and Sports Council, an IT Ninja, and has completed a Silver Duke of Edinburgh Award.

In the Cultural Cornerstone Joe has been a successful Debater and Public Speaker. He has participated in Debating every year, being part of winning Kerikeri High School teams in Northland Debating and participating in New Zealand Secondary Schools Debating competitions.

Joe was regularly a Kerikeri High School Speech finalist and has won the Northland Rotary Speech Competition, the Lions Young Ambassador Speech Competition and was the winner of the National Race Unity Speech Competition.

Joe also represented Kerikeri High School in Auctioneering, placing second in New Zealand in Year 12 and winning the national competition this year.

In previous years Joe has been the recipient of WAKA awards in Years 7, 8, 9, and 10, won Kerikeri High School Junior, Intermediate and Senior Debating awards, the PTA Cup for Year 8 Speech, the Dee Cup for Year 10 Speech, the McDiarmid Cup for Senior Speech, and the Ferrier Prize for Consistent Excellence in Drama.

Joe was awarded Elite Academic Honours Awards for NCEA Level One and NCEA Level Two. He was also awarded Cultural Honours eight times for his achievements in Debating, Public Speaking and Auctioneering.

Joe has an Honours Award for Leadership with Service, for a total of eleven Kerikeri High School Elite Honours awards over the last three years.

University Scholarships

Congratulations to the following Year 13 students who have been awarded scholarships to support them in their tertiary studies. These prestigious scholarships come with substantial financial awards and mentoring. This year an incredible total of \$579,480 was offered to Kerikeri High School students. This marks an excellent start to their tertiary studies, and we wish them all the best.

Alice Calnan was awarded the Tangaroa Scholarship from the Royal New Zealand Navy (RNZN) which includes all university fees and associated expenses, plus a full-time salary. She will attest into the RNZN and complete Junior Officer Common Training, then enrol at the University of Auckland to study Mechatronics Engineering. Upon graduation, Alice will serve in the Navy as a Weapons Engineer Officer. The value of the scholarship over four years comes to \$280,000.

James Poon was offered the Undergraduate Academic Excellence International Scholarship from the University of Technology, Sydney. UTS provides reduced fees to high performing international students who enrol in an undergraduate program. This scholarship covers 25% of James' tuition fees for the duration of his Undergraduate Degree, at a value of approximately NZ\$56,000 over four years.

The Sir Edmund Hillary Scholarship was awarded to **Indiana Williamson**. This is the University of Waikato's premier school leaver scholarship, valued at \$35,000 over the four years of his degree. It supports students to continue to excel in a sporting code or creative or performing art, to achieve high academic standards, and to develop leadership qualities through a tailored leadership and personal development programme. A maximum of only 15 scholarships are awarded each year to New Zealand students.

Ray Haines and **Ella Parker** were awarded the University of Auckland Academic Potential Scholarship valued at the top tier of \$25,000, which also guarantees them a place in a university hall of residence. This scholarship supports students who have achieved academically to undertake tertiary studies and show motivation to succeed.

Joe Howells was awarded the University of Auckland Top Achiever Scholarship. Every year the University receives

thousands of applications for these awards from students throughout New Zealand. Valued at \$25,000, these Scholarships recognise exceptional ability and outstanding achievements as well as leadership potential.

Auckland University of Technology (AUT) recognises student academic achievement, potential leadership ability and contribution to the school, community, or cultural pursuits. Welcome to Auckland Scholarships are available to high achieving students living in provincial/rural areas intending to enrol at AUT. This \$24,120 scholarship covers accommodation at Mayoral Drive for 2024 and a contribution towards fees in Years 2 and 3. Congratulations to recipients **Holly Pickery, Ariella Ripohau** and **Lillie Tai**.

The Waka Moana Scholarship from Auckland University is awarded to Māori and Pacific students from low socio-economic regions attending university for the first time. The Scholarship includes a guaranteed place in a hall of residence and will cover the costs of catered accommodation in a standard room, up to a value of \$22,000, and a laptop to keep. **Milaan Butler, Atea Rush** and **Cavalli Taotahi-Hohaia** were recipients this year.

Te Ara Whānui Scholarship recognises the importance the University of Waikato assigns to fostering, developing, and protecting excellence of Māori, and kapa haka, kaupapa Māori, tikanga, reo and mātauranga Māori. **Peata Wyeth-Hura** was proud to receive this scholarship at a value of \$20,000. Te Ara Whānui provides a platform for Māori students to strive for excellence in a programme of study at the University of Waikato and to awaken and widen knowledge of Māori.

Shannon Miringaorangi, Harry Sadgrove and **Isabella Elia** accepted the University of Otago Māori and Pacific Peoples Entrance Scholarships, valued at \$18,500. Established by the University in 2005 to celebrate academic excellence and cultural diversity, this Scholarship encourages the progression of Māori and indigenous Pacific Peoples into tertiary study.

Rachelle Nichols was awarded the University of Otago 150th Scholarship to the value of \$16,500. These scholarships provide

for students who have demonstrated academic ability and show potential and motivation to succeed at university.

The UC Engineering International Scholarship recognises top international scholars and supports them in study towards an undergraduate Engineering degree at the University of Canterbury. Our long-term international student **Simone Wu** accepted this award, receiving \$15,000 towards her Engineering degree.

University of Otago's Leaders of Tomorrow Entrance Scholarship was established to assist students who have demonstrated all-round ability and who exhibit leadership potential to attend the University of Otago. **Zoe Ackers** and **Grace Calnan** received this scholarship to the value of \$7,500.

Alumni and friends of the University of Otago gifted funds to provide the 71-73 Alumni Frank Leong Entrance Scholarship for high calibre students to attend the University. These scholarships are offered to students who have demonstrated academic ability and who can show potential and motivation to succeed at university. **Stella Littlefair** accepted the scholarship valued at \$6,000.

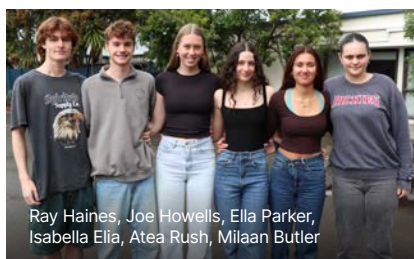

Each valued at \$5,000, they are offered to students from rural areas entering their first year of full-time undergraduate study in Nursing, Medicine, or Allied Health related courses at any New Zealand Universities, Polytechnics, or PTEs.

Alice Calnan received the UC Hiranga Scholarship for academic excellence. The \$5,000 scholarship recognises and supports top-achieving students commencing an undergraduate degree programme at the University of Canterbury. The scholarships are available for those who get excellence endorsement at NCEA Level 2.

The Wellington Tangiwai Scholarship valued at \$5,000 awarded to **Cameron Willis**, recognises Victoria University of Wellington's commitment to supporting academically strong school leavers to study at the University. These scholarships are offered

to the top 600 school-leaver applicants enrolling in any of the University's bachelor's degree programmes.

The Wellington Totoweka Scholarship recognises the University's commitment to equity issues in supporting students to have access to education. **Analise Moody** was a recipient this year and can choose to put the scholarship, valued at \$5,000, towards accommodation costs at a Victoria hall of residence, or as a contribution towards her first year living costs.

Mereana Huirama-Moore was a recipient of the \$5,000 University of Auckland's Faculty of Business and Economics, Entry Level Undergraduate Scholarship. This is to support students in their first year of university study and to encourage excellence in the study of subjects in the Faculty of Business and Economics.

The University of Otago New Frontiers Excellence Entrance Scholarships were established to recognise academic excellence in secondary school study.

Jeanne Shaw and **Emma Thomson** were awarded this scholarship of \$3,500.

STAR is about our Senior students getting to experience what tertiary study is like. This year we made the most of it, offering many opportunities to our Year 13 graduating students.

We took five students to the Girls in Infrastructure Day Out hosted by Fulton Hogan, showcasing females in a wide range of roles in Infrastructure. Four students attended the Tai Tokerau campus Queenstown Resort College Taster Week for three days in the July and September holidays. This was to learn about what QRC offers and the opportunities that are available. Students also spent two days in Paihia with International Travel College completing a Flight Attendant Course. During the second half of the year, Simone Wu was enrolled in a University of Canterbury Mathematics paper.

NorthTec Future Trades had two days where our students could experience all that the Dyer Street Campus has to offer, with students taking up the chance to try two workshops during the day. NorthTec also hosted a Nursing Student for a Day and held an Open Day to explore the courses available. Students attended a three-day introduction to the Beauty Industry Course, learning a mix of theory and practical application. Brett Cumming completed an Introduction to Forestry and then a Basic Chainsaw Course through NorthTec. The tutor was so impressed with his eagerness that he arranged a site visit for Brett.

Year 12 student Harley Barker attended the **Trades Academy**, Rangahau Ahumara Kai program, at Plant and Food Research in Kerikeri. He attended one day per week for nearly three terms and learnt a range of skills and knowledge in Horticulture. Harley gained 35 credits towards his NCEA, learning harvesting, packing, canopy maintenance, sowing seeds and monitoring germination all while following workplace health and safety.

GATEWAY

Gateway is a work experience programme where mature and work-ready Year 12 and Year 13 students are encouraged to work one day a week for a minimum of five weeks. In 2023 we had 106 individual students to place. We placed 119 students within 134 roles with 84 different employers. Some students completed two placements, exploring different pathways. We now have previous Gateway students giving back as Gateway employers.

Students who undertake Gateway are working in real workplaces, gaining work experience, and building skills for employment. Students are expected to earn 20 credits while on Gateway, completing core generic Unit Standards throughout the year. We also put on First Aid courses and Health and Safety courses in the school holidays. Where possible, we organise units of work from the industry training organisations to ensure it is relevant and engaging for our students.

We provide students with any equipment they may need, and for students who cannot make their own way to the placement, we can provide transport. We encourage students to find their own placement, however we have a great relationship with many employers so will always contact them if a student is unable to do so themselves.

Students are doing work experience in a range of pathways including arboriculture, aquaculture, agricultural contracting, carpet laying, diesel mechanic, early childcare education, electrical, hairdressing, high-performance automotive engineering, hospitality, nursing, real estate, and scaffolding. Many students gain part-time paid employment or even apprenticeships from their Gateway employers, however this is not an expectation. Students gain skills they can add to their CV and usually references from employers.

This year we also hosted three very successful Learner Driver Licence courses, run by Tata Morgan from Te Rūnanga o Whaingaroa, assisted by Neil Varton from the local police.

The Prime Ministers' Vocational Excellence Award is in its fifth year, in 2023 **Stella Crawford** was awarded the \$2,000 cash prize. This award celebrates the achievements of secondary school students enrolled in vocational programmes. Stella undertook her placement in agriculture last year and then decided to try early childcare education. Stella has since been offered part-time work in 2024 with her Gateway employer while she undertakes her Bachelor of Teaching (ECE). Her passion and collegial discussions were mentioned by her employer as was her reliability and use of initiative.

During 2023, Gateway students have moved on to apprenticeships or full-time work, winning positions in trades such as roofing, scaffolding, diesel mechanic, electrician,



building, plumbing, butchery and air conditioning. After the NCEA exams we have students beginning apprenticeships in building and arboriculture. We congratulate our students who have gained part-time work with their Gateway employers or gained work due to their placement and the qualifications gained while undertaking their placements.



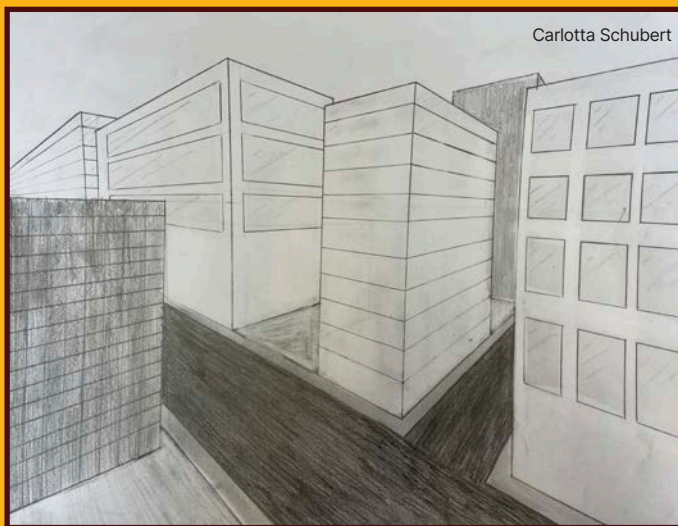

Ngā Taonga

Te Pou o Manakō Kapa Haka competed at Te Tai Tokerau Secondary Schools Kapa Haka Tōkihi ki Tua, hosted by Te Rangi Āniwaniwa in Kaitiāia. Two of our waiata paid tribute to Pāpā Nau Epiha and Matua Mohi Kara, two loved and uniquely influential Rangatira of Te Tai Tokerau who recently passed away. *I roto i ngā tau, tokomaha ngā tāngata i whai wāhi ki tēnei kapa a Te Pou o Manakō hei pou whakawhirinaki mā mātou. Ko tō mātou poutokomanawa tērā a Nana Bloss, ko Pāpā Hirini Kingi tērā, ā ko Pāpā Nau Epiha, ko Matua Mohi Kara ērā tahi anō ka ngaro i te tirohanga kanohi. Ko tō mātou tū, he whakamānawa i a rātou, otira he tū hei whakatinana i wā rātou dhākī. E ngā taonga o te mate, haere mai haere.*

As a rōpū, we fundraised for new kākahu, retaining kōrero from the original kākahu from over thirty-five years ago and introducing new kōrero. The central diamond shape represents the pātiki, a well know symbol used by those who live by the moana (Pēwhairangi/Te Kerei Mangonui). The large whetū represents te taha wairua and guides us towards spiritual enlightenment, while also reminding us about our cultural identity within our kura and within the world. The two hues of blue link our school colours and our awa Te Wairoa and Te Awa o ngā Rangatira. The small tapatoru represent students past, present, and future. The black of the kākahu signifies the whenua and gives acknowledgement to Ngāti Rēhia, the mana whenua and local hapū.

Tōkihi ki Tua was an amazing experience that helped our tēina grow as kaihaka and gave the tuākana the opportunity to grow leaderships skills. Te Pou o Manakō is a place for us to connect to our cultural identity, whakawhanaungatanga, expose us to hītori, te reo Māori me ngā tikanga.



Te Pou o Manakō supported Te Hui Ahurei o Ngāti Rēhia Kapa Haka Festival at Whitiōra Marae in Te Tii, now in its second year. Te Pou o Manakō, alongside local primary schools, showcased their remarkable talent and dedication. Hosted by the hapū of Ngāti Rēhia and by Riverview School, the event united the community in preserving their cultural heritage.

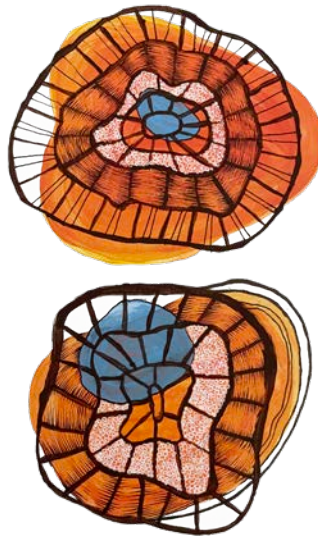

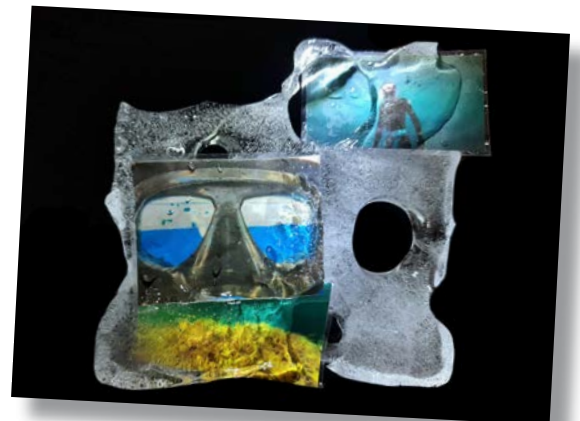

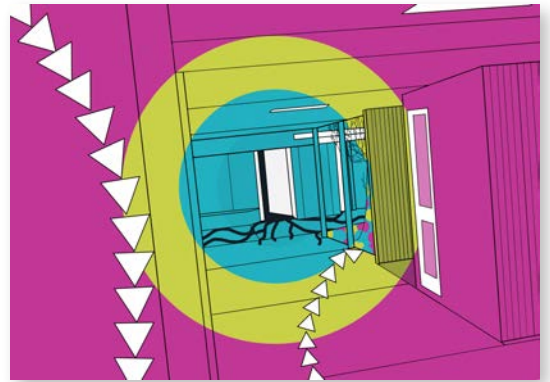

Jessie Davis represented our school in the W1 250m race. She placed first in the Te Takere final (Plate final) with a time of 1:15.27. Darcy Bavister, Ko Te Temepara Tiwai Apiata, Marama Porter, Stella Davis, Te Awe Seymour and Hawaiki Taituha competed in the W6 500m turn race and the W6 250m straight race. After some very

challenging weather conditions and a few collisions, the team progressed to the Te Ihu (Championship) final for the W6 500m turn race and placed seventh in New Zealand with a time of 2.35.99. They progressed to win the Te Takere (Plate) final for the W6 250m straight race with a time of 1.11.03.

A very big thank you to Mr Gaz Jarman who volunteered his time to paint a hoe (paddle) for the team to use as a raffle prize. An outstanding campaign from a group of mana wahine who will progress further in the world of Waka Ama because they are very committed.



Sailing

It's been a great development year for the Kerikeri High School Sailing, and we have welcomed several new members to the race squad. They are learning fast and showing great promise for the future.

The sailing team was successful at the regional championships in Parua Bay, tying on points, then the national championships at Algies Bay was badly impacted by the weather. Our young team finished a credible 10th out of 28 teams. Special mention goes to captain Charley Cates who is in his last year with the team. Charley has inspired a new generation of young sailors who all strive to beat him on the racecourse.

In fleet racing Erin Kee (Year 11) and Isla Kee (Year 10) became the Women's National Champions at the RS Feva Nationals finishing 2nd out of 45 boats. The sisters were chosen to represent New Zealand at the European and World Championships in Hungary and Italy.

The RS Feva Europeans was held on Lake Balaton in Hungary in very hot conditions in July. After four days racing, Erin and Isla were placed 2nd Women and 7th overall out of 53 boats. Later, the World Championships were held on the Mediterranean Sea in Tuscany, Italy. They finished 4th Women and 21st overall out of 210 boats after 5 days of racing. Erin and Isla went onto the podium to collect medals for finishing as 3rd Family Team. The trip was invaluable in adding to the girls' experience of sailing in big competitive fleets.

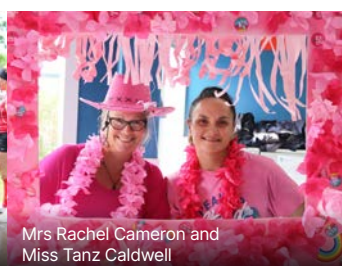

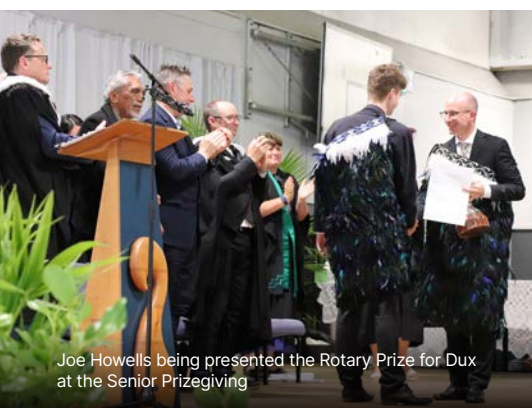

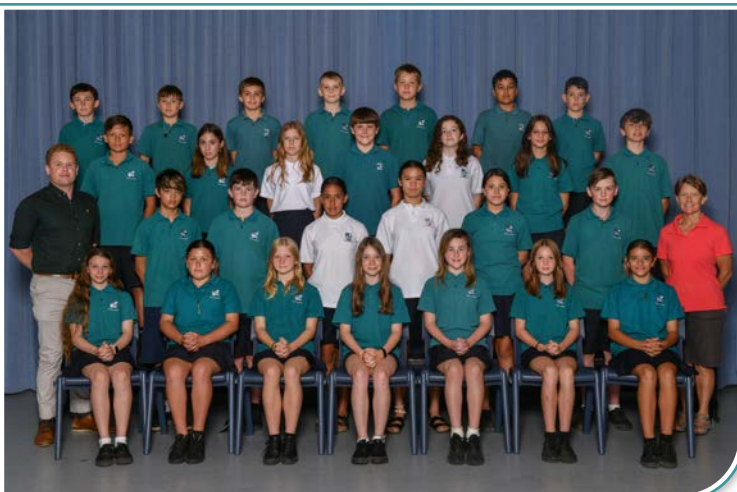
