Principal's Message

Kia ora koutou

The short first term is rapidly coming towards its conclusion, with the usual ten weeks of Term 1 activities compressed into nine weeks. It's been busy and exciting, and our teachers and staff have been working hard. Our Peer Support Camps for Year 7 and 13 students are halfway through on Urupukapuka Island, and we have just begun our inaugural Year 9 Camps at the Marsden Point Christian Camp. There's been a huge amount of summer sport happening, and the summer weather has allowed us to run a number of field trips in different subject areas.

Like all schools we offer a lot of highly sort after opportunities to represent the school which involve selection and consequently are limited in number. Examples include our Year 13 Prefect Leaders, Te Pou o Manako, debating teams, and sports teams. First teams for winter codes are currently either in selection processes or have been selected, and inevitably there will be disappointment for some.

I spoke about the importance of failure at Prizegivings last year. At different times and at different points in our lives we all face disappointment and failure, and how we respond is really important. Equally how we support our children as they deal with the inevitable setbacks along the way is also critical. Questioning the process, running down selectors, coaches, and deriding those chosen does not support our young people, nor does it help equip them with the resilience they need. Rather, it heightens a sense of resentment and often puts an unnecessary 'chip on their shoulder'.

The best way to support your young person with disappointment is to acknowledge their feelings, acknowledge they did their best, and encourage them on towards their next goal or target. And if they were aiming for the A team and they made the B team, celebrate their selection and don't allow them to quit, or play for someone else. They made a commitment and they should keep it. They will be better for this in the long run.

Two building projects of significance will begin at school in the coming months. The first is the replacement of the three temporary classrooms that were located on the courts between the Gymnasium and the Swimming Pool. The arrival of these three classrooms is imminent, and earthworks will begin in the next week or so.

More significant is the construction of four permanent classrooms, funded by the Ministry of Education, to cope with our roll growth. These classrooms will be the beginning of the relocation of the Mathematics Department and will be built where our playing courts are currently located. We are hopeful that this year's Government's Budget will see subsequent funds for us for the construction of an additional 12 classrooms, funded again by the Ministry of Education, this time for modernisation of our property, which will join the four roll growth classrooms on the courts.

Once those classrooms are opened, we will demolish the very old and tired Prefabs which currently house our Mathematics Department and replace them with a multipurpose astroturf court alongside our Gymnasium. This will open the middle of our school even more and be a welcome addition to our facilities.

Over the next few months, we are also taking steps to secure our school boundary, with a fence being erected along the entirety of our bottom field which borders Jacaranda Place. This will significantly reduce the amount of unwanted foot traffic through the school and improve student and staff safety. We will then subsequently erect a similar fence along the boundary of our top field which borders the Kerikeri Domain. This fence will include an ungated atea for entry and exit and will clearly define the school boundary for members of the public.

These fencing projects have been in planning for some time now, and they have not happened because of social media pressure. I always welcome parent and whānau feedback and am always willing to hear concerns. Often, I may be able to give reassurance or explanation, and at other times it may be that I was not aware. Please, if you have concerns, ideas etc contact us at school in the first instance.

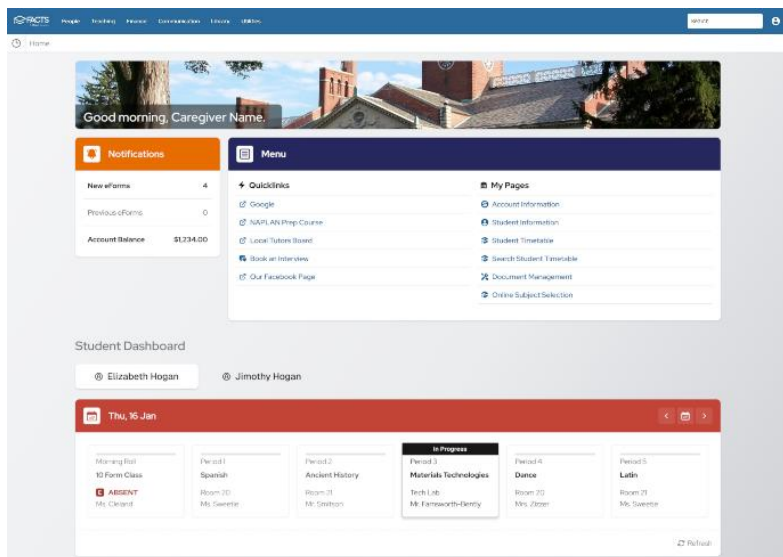
New FACTS Homepage

It is a flexible qualification allowing students to demonstrate their skills and knowledge through a mix of internal and external assessments. For Year 11 students to succeed in 2026, they will need to make the most of every lesson, create dedicated study time, ask questions and seek help from their teachers, pay close attention to detail and actively work on their weaker areas for improvement. Building confidence in these fundamental skills is key to their academic success. I advise students to make the most of our Tutorial time to study, revise and prepare for upcoming assessments – a great opportunity to stay on top of their workload.

I highly recommend Year 11 students and parents/whānau keep track of academic progress using the NZQA portal and our school FACTS student page. Communication with subject teachers is now streamlined using the email links on our regular Progress Reports.

Our newly appointed Class Representatives for Term 1 and the Year 13 Prefects are working closely with me to create engaging events and opportunities for this year group. I extend my thanks to all who applied for these leadership roles.

As we begin to think about career pathways and applications for tertiary education courses and scholarships, I strongly encourage all students to build their Kerikeri High School Four Cornerstones programme repertoire. The Academic, Cultural, Leadership with Service, and Sport Cornerstones are vital for a balanced education and personal development. These skills are essential, not just for building student curriculum vitae, but for everyday life and future learning.

Welcome back to all caregivers, whānau, and our Year 12 cohort. It's wonderful to see students return with fresh energy and a growing sense of maturity as they continue their journey as senior members of Kerikeri High School. Year 12 is an important stage—one where students continue to grow as lifelong learners and take meaningful steps toward their personal goals.

This year, Mrs Rakena (Year 12 Deputy Principal), and our Pastoral Team and I are encouraging students to recognise the influence they have over their own learning, attitude, and involvement in school life. Being a senior means acting with respect, showing integrity, and building the habits that support their own version of personal excellence.

Academically - NCEA Level 2 is a key milestone requiring 60 credits at Level 2 or above, plus Literacy and Numeracy. Endorsements at Merit or Excellence require 50 credits at those levels, reflecting consistent effort and growing ownership of learning. Tutorial time is a valuable opportunity for students to stay organised, revise, or plan ahead, and have regular check-ins with Form Teachers help them reflect and stay on track.

Year 12 also provides many opportunities to get involved through our Four Cornerstones—WAKA team, sports, cultural groups, school events, and service roles such as Class Reps, Ball Committee or Student Librarians. These experiences help students discover their strengths and develop confidence, communication, and teamwork skills. A highlight of the year will be the OPC trip in July, giving students the chance to challenge themselves and strengthen friendships through shared adventure in a setting that offers different conditions and challenges than the classroom.

As students step into their senior roles, it's the everyday actions that show true leadership. Small things—being prepared, following through, helping others, and contributing positively in class—make a real difference. These actions reflect our WAKA values and show that students are taking their role as seniors seriously.

With next year's Prefects now being selected after the November exams, students have the whole year to demonstrate the kind of leader they're becoming.
